Inset Text:

"Composed from notes made during the stay of the Sloops Otkrytie and Blagonamerenny in 1820 and 1821 in the months of December and January. Depths shown in sazhen. The Presidio of San Francisco was found to be at Latitude 37°47'51",9 N, Longitude 122°26'38",5 W from Greenwich. Declination of the compass 14°36'30",1 E, inclination [dip] of the magnetic needle 62°56'6". Applied time 10 hours 27 minutes."

In the early 19th century the Russian Navy made numerous voyages to the west coast of North America. These naval ships carried highly trained scientists and naturalists who created the earliest records of life in California. Many of the records and documents relating to voyages became the property of the Russian government, and are now stored in the Russian archives. In 2006, the National Endowment for the Humanities, working with the Fort Ross Interpretive Association, funded an interdisciplinary team to research, translate, and publish the untapped body of Russian information about early California and North America. This map is one such document.
