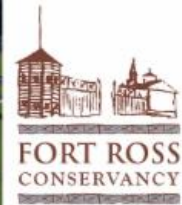

Fort Ross & Salt Point News

Dear friends of Fort Ross and Salt Point,

It's wet and messy along the coast, with heavy rain, some flooding, and the occasional downed tree along the road. Not the best day for an outdoor excursion, but we all know brighter days are ahead - starting April 1st, Fort Ross is open for high season seven days a week, and Alaska Native Day and Fort Ross Festival will be here in a heartbeat.

To help us launch into Spring, FRC recently received a generous grant from the Bothin Foundation, a San Francisco foundation whose mission is to connect nonprofit organizations to the tools they need for success. The tool we purchased was a "gator," a sparkly blue four-seater utility vehicle that we'll use to shuttle people and things to all corners of our park and especially to assist visitors who have mobility issues and want to access our programming. The day it arrived at Fort Ross we'd all been cooped up in the office working through our respective piles of paperwork, and with the sun fleetingly out between storms, we decided to take it for a spin. I pulled rank and drove first, heading down towards the compound on rutted old Highway One with all of us hollering like teenagers. That's when when we saw the first whale spout-- so many whales blowing and breaching and so easy to spot just offshore. It never gets old, to witness these 40-foot behemoths making their annual pilgrimage up and down the coast, cruising past modern urban centers like Los Angeles and San Francisco and northward along the pristine coastline of Fort Ross and Salt Point. We stopped to watch them and take in that vast Pacific Ocean, knowing that it will indeed be a good summer season, and hoping you will join us for just such a moment.

REMEMBERING DAN MURLEY



I must report the sad news that Ranger Dan Murley passed away recently at his home in Timber Cove. He was my dear friend and a loving husband to Sandy and father to Hannah and Oona. He moved to California from Worcester Mass, after serving in the US Army in the late 60's.

Dan had many facets like the beads, baskets and bones he so loved. Writer, archaeologist, naturalist, historian, geologist, winemaker, musician, music lover, joker, photographer, birder, SCUBA diver, fisherman, museum curator, friend of native people, ambassador, EMT, peace officer, Irishman...were a few sides of his character. He disliked war, pollution, litter and waste.

He loved Fort Ross and helped protect and interpret its history for over 30 years. He was well known and appreciated by the local community, and has hundreds of friends through the State Park system. His weekly Ranger Reports were thrilling to read. In them he might detail colorful wildlife encounters or describe the smell of newly fallen rain, the clearing of clouds, or the power of the ocean.

I am saddened by his passing, and appreciative of the times we got to spend together solving the world's problems. His best archaeological find was his wife Sandy.
